



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
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EDUCATION OF DEAF-MUTES
DIRECTORS' REPORT.

SALEM, OREGON, December 21, 1891.

To the Hon. Geo. W. McBride, Secretary of State—

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Board of Directors of the Oregon School for the Education of Deaf Mutes:

GENTLEMEN: I have the honor, in accordance with the requirements of law, to lay before you the eleventh biennial report of this institution.

During the biennial period now ending, the number of pupils in actual attendance shows a very considerable increase, and it is also gratifying to note that at the opening of the present term the pupils returned to school with commendable promptitude. It is a sad fact, however, that there are within the State several deaf children of school age whose parents, through ignorance or mistaken ideas, do not send them to school. Those parents do their children a grievous wrong, and as the uneducated deaf mute cannot be held responsible for his actions, and is therefore more or less a menace to public safety, it would be sound economy on the part of the State to enact a law making it compulsory to send deaf mute children to school for a stated number of years.

BUILDINGS AND SITE.

The institution possesses five plain wooden buildings erected for temporary purposes and, therefore, destitute alike of architectural style, solidity, and safety. The central building which comprises the schoolrooms, dining-rooms and kitchen, is the only building adapted to the needs of institution life. It does not, however, afford sufficient accommodation for the present and ever-increasing number of pupils. The heating arrangements are unsatisfactory; and ventilation, except by open doors and windows, is entirely lacking. During a session of an hour and a half or two hours in the schoolrooms, the atmosphere becomes very much vitiated; and the same condition is observable in the children's dining-room when all the pupils have been crowded into it for thirty minutes.

The buildings occupied respectively as boys' and girls' quarters show unmistakably that they are make-shifts. Considerable ingenuity has been displayed in making additions from time to time as necessity demanded, but hygiene and safety have, perforce, been secondary considerations. The accommodation is scant and the rooms bare. The sleeping-rooms are low-roofed, and the stairs leading to them narrow, and in case of fire, escape would be difficult. Even the most rigid economist must admit the necessity of housing deaf children in structures of brick or stone. The very thought of fire in a wooden building where deaf children are asleep is appalling. The roaring of flames and crackling of timbers would never rouse them to their peril, and ere alarm reached them they might die a most frightful death.

A new site should be purchased, and new buildings should be erected capable of accommodating at least a hundred pupils, so as to provide not only for present needs, but also for the wants of the immediate future. The following is an extract from the report of the last Legislative Committee referring to this matter:—

"As to the grounds: We are of the opinion, that the present site, situated in the populous part of the city, is much too small in area for the economical and sanitary arrangement of said school, and in our judgment suitable arrangements should be made very soon for the removal of said school to a suburban location, where more land can be had, and where the inmates of the school would have more ample facilities for helping to pay for their maintenance.

"After giving careful consideration to the matter, we are led to the conclusion that it would be good business judgment for the State to begin now to make permanent arrangements for the removal of said school to a proper location in the near vicinity of Salem, and to that end we recommend an appropriation by the present Legislature of five thousand dollars for the purchase of a suitable site, not to exceed fifty acres, and we herewith present a bill in each House asking that such appropriation be made. We believe the next Legislature should then make suitable provision, for the erection of permanent buildings on the premises selected, and also arrange for the sale of the present site and for the transfer of the management of the institution to a properly constituted State Board. While the present Board have been faithful and efficient in their management of the school, yet they express an entire willingness to transfer the control of it to any properly constituted authority when the State assumes to make permanent and proper arrangements for the carrying on of such school."

INDUSTRIAL DEPARTMENT.

At present several of the pupils receive instruction in printing. There is published at the school a weekly paper, which affords the pupils an opportunity to learn the printing trade, informs parents of the news of the school, and helps to connect the deaf with the general public.

There is also a small broom-shop at the school, where the boys make brooms of a good quality.

Industrial training, though second to mental development, is almost as important as the instruction given in the schoolroom. It is well to give the deaf a knowledge of language, to acquaint them with geography, and instill patriotism into their minds as they study the thrilling pages of our country's history. To make the deaf intelligent, moral, and patriotic is a grand achievement. But, with all this, there is a possibility of producing merely educated paupers. It is further necessary to teach them trades, so as to make them industrious, self-supporting, wealth-producing citizens, and to endow them with "the glorious privilege of being independent."

It would, therefore, be well to extend the industrial department so as to include instruction in carpentry, shoemaking, tailoring, and farming.

THE SCHOOL.

The studies in school are directed so that the pupils may obtain a knowledge of the English language, develop thought, and acquire such general information as is necessary for intelligent citizenship. Instruction is given by means of the natural sign language of the deaf, the manual alphabet and writing. The older pupils study similar text-books to those used in the public schools; but as their mental development had been retarded in early childhood for lack of a means of communication with their fellows, they are, relatively as to age, not so far advanced in their studies as children blessed with all the senses.

Instruction is given in articulation and lip-reading to a limited number of pupils. Oral instruction has become a recognized department in every well-equipped school for the deaf, and a specially qualified teacher should be employed to devote all his time to that work.

The school has been fortunate in securing the services of faithful teachers, and there is no profession that demands greater patience, perseverance, energy and skill than the work of educating the deaf.

GENERAL.

The school has been under the management of Rev. P. S. Knight for the greater part of the biennial period now ending. He had been Superintendent of the school since its inception, twenty-two years ago, until August last. To him, therefore, belongs in large measure whatever of credit is due for the work the school has accomplished in the past, and for its present flourishing condition.

The self-sacrificing labors of Rev. P. S. Knight and Mrs. Knight, respectively, as Superintendent and Matron of this institution are well known, and in their retirement from office the school feels keenly the loss of their long and ripe experience and skillful management.

In an institution where youths between seven and twenty years of age are congregated there are sure to be occasional cases of sickness, more or less serious. The number of pupils is now sufficiently large to warrant the Board in engaging the services of a properly qualified medical practitioner, who for an agreed upon retaining fee should render his professional services whenever required. Such an arrangement would probably be cheaper, and certainly more satisfactory, than the usual method of running up a doctor's bill.

An appropriation of twenty thousand dollars will be required to meet the ordinary expenditures of the institution for the next two years, and a further liberal appropriation is needed to provide a new site, buildings, and equipments.

It is my pleasant duty to state that the various officers of the institution have been diligent and faithful in the performance of their respective duties, and have worked together in harmony for the best interests of the school.

In conclusion, I thank you, gentlemen of the Board, for your valuable direction and cordial coöperation, and for the kindly interest you have at all times shown in whatever pertained to the welfare of the school.
