OHSU Mission

Oregon Health & Science University is the state's only comprehensive public academic health center. Its fundamental purpose is to improve the health and well-being of people in Oregon and beyond. A ten-member Board of Directors nominated by the Governor and confirmed by the Oregon Senate governs the University.

As part of its multifaceted mission, OHSU strives for excellence in education, research and scholarship, clinical practice and community service. Through its dynamic interdisciplinary environment, OHSU stimulates the spirit of inquiry, initiative, and cooperation among students, faculty and staff.

Jay Waldron, Chairman Portland Attorney

Joseph Robertson, Jr. President, OHSU Ex Officio

Joseph Robertson, Jr., appointed OHSU's president in 2006, has led numerous initiatives aimed at providing improved health care access to Oregonians. He began at OHSU as a resident in 1979 and held numerous posts, including director of the Casey Eye Institute, and most recently, dean of the School of Medicine. Robertson is an acclaimed surgeon and researcher who has participated in numerous clinical trials.

MardiLyn Saathoff joined the OHSU Board in October 2009. 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OHSU Accreditation

Regional Accreditation

Oregon Health & Science University has received continuous regional accreditation by the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities (NWCCU) since 1980. OHSU is authorized to offer associate, baccalaureate, masters, professional practice doctoral and research doctoral degrees, as well as graduate certificates. The last NWCCU accreditation visit occurred in May 2012 and the next visit is scheduled for late spring 2015.

Regional accreditation is a process of recognizing educational institutions for performance, integrity and quality that entitles them to the confidence of the educational community and general public. Institutions accredited by the NWCCU are required to examine their own missions, goals, operations and achievements. Since the institution is reviewed by NWCCU on a regular, ongoing cycle, continued self-study and improvement is necessary for OHSU to ensure compliance with accreditation standards. In order to assure NWCCU, key stakeholders and the general public that OHSU is fulfilling its mission, four core themes, along with objectives and indicators of performance, have been defined. The four core themes are:

- Learning Environment
- Interprofessional Education
- Clinical and Translational Research
- Health System and Health Policy Leadership

Specialized Accreditation

Specialized accreditation is a type of accreditation status that is designated for specialized academic programs within an institution of higher education that has already been awarded regional institutional accreditation. Specialized accreditation focuses on specific aspects of the program's academic field of study.

Currently, OHSU has 26 academic fields of study with specialized accreditation from 15 different specialized accrediting agencies. 





Distribution of Women Enrollment by Level of Study Fall 2014





First-Year Students by Oregon Residency Status Fall 2005 through Fall 2014







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





Graduation Rates of 3-Year OCNE Nursing Students Fall 2007 through Fall 2011 Entering Cohorts





Total Grants, Scholarships and Loans Awarded 2004-05 through 2013-14





Oregon Opportunity Grant: Annual Student Awards 2004-05 through 2013-14









Ranked Faculty by Gender 2014







Total Revenue by Hospital and University FY 2005 through FY 2014







Share of State General Fund Appropriations 1989-91 through 2013-15









Hospital Average Length of Stay and Occupancy Rate FY 2005 through FY 2014



Discharges and Discharge Days Without Newborns FY 2005 through FY 2014



Hospital Patients by Type FY 2005 through FY 2014










1) DMD Access: Percent of entering cohort who are in-state DMD students




3) Nursing Access: Percent of entering cohort who are in-state nursing students




5) Degrees: Total number of degrees and certificates awarded




2) MD Access: Percent of entering cohort who are in-state MD students




4) Nursing Completion: Percent of nursing student cohorts completing bachelor's degrees within 150% of normal completion time









8) Nursing Workforce: Total bachelor's degrees awarded in nursing




10) Professional Competence: Percent of DMD students passing senior-level credentialing exams on first attempt




7) Physician Workforce: Total number of MD degrees awarded








14) Oregon Poison Center: Percent of calls to the Oregon Poison Center managed without requiring referrals to community





Loans as Percent of Total Financial Aid to DMD Students 2004-05 through 2013-14





Loans as Percent of Total Financial Aid to MD Students 2004-05 through 2013-14



School of Nursing Ten-Year Enrollment Trend Fall 2005 through Fall 2014





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



A

Academic Health Center

Provides the classification of OHSU as an accredited, degree-granting institution of higher education that educates a wide variety of health care professionals, offers comprehensive basic and advanced patient care, and conducts a broad spectrum of biomedical and health services research. AHCs must include: an allopathic or osteopathic school of medicine; at least one other health professions school or program (such as allied health, dentistry, graduate studies, nursing, pharmacy, public health, and veterinary medicine); and, one or more owned or affiliated teaching hospitals, health systems or other organized health care services.

Academic Year

The year beginning with summer term and ending with spring term. For example, academic year 2012-13 begins with summer term 2012 and ends with spring term 2013.

Adjunct Faculty

Generally staff members within the University or professionals in the local community whose areas of expertise are insufficiently represented on the faculty; they ordinarily hold the terminal degree in the field. Adjunct faculty appointments add the experience of professionals to enhance academic instruction.

Adjusted Census Day

Adjusted census day = (gross patient revenue / inpatient revenue) * census day. See Census Day.

Admitted Student

Student who has been offered admission into an OHSU academic degree or certificate program.

AFSCME

Nearly 40% of OHSU's employees are represented by Local 328 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME). AFSCME-represented positions range from pharmacists, certified nursing assistants and public safety officers to research analysts, laboratory animal technicians and administrative assistants.

Applied Student

Student who has submitted an application for admission into an OHSU academic degree or certificate program.

Ambulatory Visits

Medical care including diagnosis, observation, treatment and rehabilitation that is provided on an outpatient basis. Ambulatory care is given to persons who are able to ambulate or walk about. A well-baby visit is considered ambulatory care even though the baby may not yet be walking.

C

Census Day

The number of days that patients (excluding newborns in the nursery) are hospitalized. Census days are based on a snapshot of patients in bed at midnight.

Certificate

An academic award, distinct from a degree, certifying the satisfactory completion of an academic instructional program or course of study. OHSU awards post-baccalaureate certificates, post-master's certificates, and post-doctoral certificates.

Consumer Price Index (CPI)

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change over time in the prices paid by urban consumers for a market basket of consumer goods and services. The CPI and its components may be used to adjust other economic series for price changes and to translate these series into inflation-free dollars.

D

Dental Admission Test (DAT) Score

Average score of admitted students in a given year on the admission test for dental school, the Dental Admission Test administered by the American Dental Association (ADA).

Degree

An academic title conferred by a university to a student who has successfully completed a specified instructional program of study. OHSU awards associate degrees, bachelor degrees, master's degrees and doctoral degrees.

Discharge

A person who was formally admitted to a hospital as an inpatient for observation, diagnosis, or treatment, with the expectation of remaining overnight or longer, and who is discharged under one of the following circumstances: (1) is formally discharged from care of the hospital and leaves the hospital; or (2) has died.

Discharge Days

The total number of days between the admission and discharge dates for each patient (length of stay). The day of admission but not the day of discharge is counted as a discharge day (except for admission and discharge on the same day, which is counted as one discharge day).

Discipline (CIP)

The academic discipline or program as reflected in the Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) published by the National Center for Educational Statistics.

E

Education and General Funds

The portion of the OHSU budget that is devoted to instructional and support services for students and faculty, including managerial and administrative functions needed to provide the services.

Educational Source

The college or university last attended prior to entering OHSU.

Ethnic or Racial Categories

Students

Ethnic or racial categories are self-identification items in which students choose the categories with which they most closely identify. The ethnic or racial group categories reported for OHSU students are defined by the United States Census Bureau and the Federal Office of Management and Budget (OMB). Those racial categories reported for students are listed on the federal IPEDS reports (effective Fall 2009) as: American Indian/ Alaska Native; Asian; Black/African American; Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander; Two or more races; and White (including people of European and Middle Eastern origins). In addition, student ethnicity is categorized as either Hispanic/Latino or Not Hispanic/Latino. Students who decline to respond are listed in the "unknown" category. These ethnic and racial categories do not include foreign students.

Employees

The ethnic or racial group categories reported for OHSU employees are defined by the United States Department of Education, Census Bureau and the Federal Office of Management and Budget (OMB): The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission of the US Department of Labor (EEO) requires employers to report various information about their employees, in particular, their racial/ethnic categories to prevent discrimination based on race/ethnicity. The 2009 racial categories include: American Indian/ Alaska Native; Asian; Black or African American; Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander; Two or more; and White. The 2009 ethnic categories are Hispanic/Latino or Not Hispanic/Latino. These racial and ethnic categories are self-identification data items in which employees choose the categories with which they most closely identify. These categories include employees who are not citizens of the United States, but have permanent residency status or a temporary work permit or visa.

Emerging Startups

STARTUPS are new companies that were dependent on licensing OHSU's intellectual property for their formation. If intellectual property was licensed to an existing startup company, this company is not a STARTUP. STARTUPS refer only to those companies that were dependent upon OHSU's intellectual property for their formation.

Enrollment

OHSU, like all other higher education institutions, uses several different definitions in counting enrollment. The various definitions serve different purposes: budget preparation, workload evaluation, federal reporting, single-point snapshots, and description of OHSU's provision of educational services.

Student Headcount Enrollment

Headcount enrollment represents the number of individual students enrolled in credit courses, regardless of course load. Historical enrollment has generally been expressed in terms of fall headcount. National comparisons of enrollment are most often made on the basis of fall headcount.

Student Full-Time Equivalent (FTE)

The student full-time equivalent (FTE) translates actual enrollment into a full-time equivalency. Calculation of the student full-time equivalent varies depending on the level and program of the student. At OHSU, undergraduate FTE is calculated as follows: credit hours divided by 15. Graduate (master's level) FTE is calculated as follows: credit hours divided by 12. PhD FTE is calculated as follows: credit hours divided by 9. The OHSU FTE for professional students is the actual professional student headcount.

Faculty

Appointment to the University faculty is comprised of a title that includes a series, rank and modifier.

Series reflects the primary assignment, focus and expectations of the faculty member and unit: professor, research professor, clinical professor, affiliate professor, scientist, staff scientist, and research assistant scientist.

Rank conferred on faculty in the academic, research, clinical and affiliate professor series includes Lecturer, Instructor, Senior Instructor, Assistant Professor, Associate Professor, and Professor (for most junior to senior ranks).

Faculty rank modifiers include the prefix "adjunct" or "visiting," the suffix "provisional or "emeritus." "Adjunct" designates a faculty with less than 0.5 FTE or a temporary appointment. "Visiting" designates a temporary appointment to the faculty, usually a faculty at another university for a designated time period. "Provisional" reflects a new faculty appointment with senior rank (professor or associate professor) pending approval by the school's Promotion and Tenure Committee. "Emeritus Professor" is an honorary title for a retired faculty member recognizing distinguished past service to OHSU. "Affiliate Professor" designates volunteer or community faculty who are not compensated by OHSU. OHSU faculty data on gender, race/ ethnicity and tenure exclude Affiliate Faculty and Emeritus Faculty.

Fee Category

Enrollment category reflecting the type of fee assessed (e.g., resident, nonresident).

Fellow (Graduate Medical Education)

An individual who has graduated medical school who is pursuing further specialty training. Generally this individual has completed a residency.

G

Grade Point Average (GPA)

Average grade based on a pre-defined scale (for example 0 to 4 points, where A=4, B=3, C=2, D=1, F=0). The undergraduate GPA is one factor used in student application and admissions processes.

Graduation Rate

Reflects the percentage of an entering cohort of students who complete a degree within a specified length of time. The common national practice used for baccalaureate completion is to report the percentage of the entering students who complete a bachelor's degree within 150% of the published time.

Graduate Record Examination (GRE)

The Graduate Record Examinations (GRE) is a standardized test that is an admissions requirement for most graduate schools in the United States. It is created and administered by Educational Testing Service.

Hospital Occupancy Rate

The number of inpatient hospital beds occupied divided by the average number of hospital beds. Serves as a measure of health facility inpatient use.

House Officer (Graduate Medical Education)

Term used to describe all postgraduate trainees (individuals who have graduated medical school). The term includes interns, residents and fellows.

I

Industry Sponsored Research Agreements

A contract through which an industry partner funds a research project at OHSU. These projects support the academic, research and/or healthcare missions of OHSU. These do not cover clinical trial agreements or other research projects funded by an industry that involve any intervention with a human subject as part of the project.

Inpatient

A patient who is admitted to a hospital or clinic for treatment that requires at least one overnight stay.

Intern (Graduate Medical Education)

An individual who has graduated medical school and is in their first year of a postgraduate training program.

Invention Disclosures

Disclosure forms received by OHSU's office of Technology Transfer & Business Development describing potential new intellectual property and/or inventions.

IPEDS

Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System, part of a series of reports collected annually by the National Center for Educational Statistics (NCES).

L

Length of Stay (LOS)

The total number of 24-hour days that a patient occupies a hospital bed.

License/Option Agreements

A LICENSE AGREEMENT formalizes the transfer of intellectual property between two parties, where the owner of the intellectual property (licensor) permits the other party (licensee) to share the rights to use the intellectual property. An OPTION AGREEMENT grants the potential licensee a time period during which it may evaluate the intellectual property and negotiate the terms of a LICENSE AGREEMENT. An OPTION AGREEMENT is not constituted by an Option clause in a research agreement that grants rights to future inventions, until an actual invention has occurred that is subject to that Option.

Μ

Medical College Admission Test (MCAT)

The Medical College Admission Test (MCAT) is required of all applicants to US Medical Schools, administered by the American Association of Medical Colleges.

N

Newborn An infant, born alive in the hospital.

Non-resident

The fee status category of students who are assessed nonresident tuition.

Non-resident Alien A student who is neither a U.S. citizen nor a resident alien (i.e., permanent resident) and holds a student visa.

0

Observation

Observation Patients are patients that have orders from a physician to remain in the hospital to be observed. Generally these individuals do not have to stay overnight. If these patients do end up staying overnight they are not considered Inpatients because they don't meet the Inpatient criteria.

ONA

OHSU members of the Association of University Registered Nurses (AURN) of the Oregon Nurses Association (ONA) comprise about 15% of OHSU's employees. Registered nurses providing patient care in the hospital and clinic settings of OHSU are ONA-represented.

Oregon Opportunity Grant

The Oregon Opportunity Grant is a state-funded, need-based grant available to undergraduates that attend an eligible Oregon postsecondary institution and meet the income eligibility requirements. OHSU's undergraduate Nursing and Radiation Therapy programs are eligible programs.

Outpatient

A patient who is admitted to a hospital or clinic for treatment that does not require an overnight stay.

Outpatient Visits

Includes emergency room visits, outpatient clinic visits, referred ancillary service visits, home health care contacts, and day care days, where the outpatient is treated and released the same day. Also included are outpatient ambulatory surgery visits, renal dialysis visits, observation care visits, psychiatric visits, chemical dependency visits, hospice outpatient visits, and adult day health care visits.

Pell Grant

The Pell Grant is a federal, need-based grant available to undergraduates that attend a postsecondary institution and meet the income eligibility requirements. OHSU's undergraduate Nursing and Radiation Therapy programs are eligible programs.

R

Resident The fee status category of students who are assessed resident tuition.

Resident (Graduate Medical Education)

An individual who has graduated medical school and is in a postgraduate training program.

S

Sponsored Research Dollars

Includes sponsored research, teaching/training grants, library grants and similar support.

T

Tuition

The mandatory charge for instruction assessed students for enrolling in an OHSU academic program.

U

Underrepresented Minority (URM)

Any ethnic or racial minority group whose representation is disproportionately less in a given context relative to their numbers in the general population constitutes an underrepresented minority.

For students, OHSU defines underrepresented minorities based on minorities underrepresented in medicine, dentistry and nursing professions. The following students are considered an underrepresented minority when self-identifying race or ethnicity as follows:

American Indian or Alaska Native Underrepresented Asian (Korean, Vietnamese) Black or African American Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander Two or more races (with at least one race classified as URM) Hispanic or Latino Ethnicity



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
