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## **A WORLD OF INFORMATION**

## Get It For Me service provides no-cost access to books and journals from across the globe

Our service known as Get It For Me provides OHSU members with no-cost access to books and journals from libraries around the world, expanding our reach beyond the Library's own collections. As part of our collaboration, we borrowed from libraries in over 30 states and dozens of cities worldwide, from Adelaide, Australia to Taipei, Taiwan.

Our average turnaround time for article requests was just over 13 hours, delivering information quickly regardless of whether we own a particular journal.

## FLEXIBLE ACCESS TO RESOURCES

### Anytime, anywhere access to books, journals and more

During OHSU's extended period of Modified Operations due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our team adjusted by transforming our services to be more adaptable. These improvements, which made the library experience more accessible and flexible, proved so useful to our community that they are now here to stay:

**Curbside pickup** is available, allowing someone who is not normally working on campus to make a quick stop for their books or equipment and be on their way.

For people whose schedules mean they cannot make it into the Library during open hours, we can place holds in convenient **after-hours lockers** for 24/7 pickup in the BICC or the Learning Resource Center in the RLSB.

### **Removing financial barriers to borrowing**

The Library has gone **fine-free**, with no more overdue fines for items that are returned after the due date. We also permanently implemented **automatic renewals** for checked-out books when no one is waiting for them. We hope these changes have encouraged borrowers who may have previously worried about incurring charges when checking out books.

### New spaces to study and collaborate

In 2022, we re-envisioned our spaces to offer more places to study and collaborate. The reconfiguration resulted in **19 new study cubicles** in the Library in the Biomedical Information Communication Center (BICC). We have also added **2 new study rooms**, available during the Library's open hours, on the 3rd floor, adding to the 23 bookable study rooms available 24/7 to OHSU members with badge access in the BICC and the Learning Resource Center in the Robertson Life Sciences Building.

Flexible equipment options, such as rolling whiteboards, and reservable items in our Equipment Collection like noise-canceling headphones, and soon, white noise machines, offer convenient ways to adapt our spaces for solo or group use.

## **SUPPORTING SCHOLARSHIP**

### Facilitating rigorous and transparent research

OHSU librarians are sought-after collaborators for their literature searching expertise, working with learners and faculty to investigate and contextualize research questions. This support is often so significant that it results in coauthorship and published acknowledgments, such as three review articles OHSU Health Sciences Education and Research Librarians co-authored in 2022.

We support research and scholarship in other vital ways, such as preparing to help OHSU researchers navigate the National Institute of Health's new Data Management and Sharing Policy, coming in January 2023. This year, we published a new guide on **Research Data and Reproducibility**, and two team members completed the National Library of Medicine course Fundamentals of Health Sciences Research Data Management. The Library also joined the Data Discovery Collaboration (DCC), a consortium that works to facilitate the visibility of hard-to-find research data. **460** librarian appointments

### **Open publishing agreements**

Faculty, learners, and staff can also access publishing support from the Library. Librarians consult with authors to identify potential journals and workflows for sharing scholarship. In 2021–2022, we also worked with several publishers to establish programs to facilitate no-cost open-access publishing. These agreements democratize engagement with open-access publishing and allow OHSU authors to broaden access to their work.

## ENGAGING ACROSS MISSIONS

## Teaching lifelong skills in information literacy

OHSU's Graduation Core Competencies include Information Literacy, which recognizes the power of information in educating, influencing, and understanding the world, while seeking and amplifying missing perspectives. The ability to locate, critically evaluate, and effectively use information is essential to achieving excellence in education, research and scholarship, clinical practice, and community service. OHSU faculty librarians regularly deliver instruction that helps learners develop these skills, including directing or co-directing **5 courses** across **2 schools** and **3 programs** in 2021-22.

## Critical approaches to information systems and teaching

The Library invested in positions and projects to address how systems of oppression are embedded in information systems and teaching practices. Faculty librarian **Tova Johnson** was promoted to the position of Critical Pedagogy and Research Librarian, and will be leading Library's efforts to align its pedagogical approaches with queer, transnational, intersectional, decolonial, antiracist, and other frameworks. We also curated several resources that draw attention to the importance of diverse and inclusive content in health sciences education, such as the **Diverse Images and Audiovisuals for Educating Health Professionals** guide.








## SHARING OHSU AND HEALTH SCIENCES HISTORY

As proud stewards of the history of OHSU and health sciences in the region, the Library's Historical Collections & Archives team cares for and promotes engagement with the unique collections entrusted to our care.

## Highlighting community mental health activism

Historical Collections & Archives Assistant **Zoë Maughan** curated our Spring 2022 exhibit, *Fostering a Culture of Empowerment in Mental Health Care: Selections from the MindFreedom International Records*. Drawing from the MindFreedom International Records, this exhibit, which is still fully available online, highlights the many ways in which activists built community in the psychiatric survivors and Mad Pride movements. The exhibit sparked new interest in the collection from across the US and Europe, and spurred a renewed connection with the MindFreedom International organization, leading us to digitize 24 issues of their publication for better community access.





## Putting Marquam Hill history in the palm of your hand

Public Services Coordinator **Meg Langford** and Archives Assistant **Zoë Maughan** developed a robust and interactive digital history tour of the Marquam Hill campus using educational platform Clio, allowing users to explore the history of OHSU's built environment from home or live from campus via the mobile app.

## **GROWING ONE-OF-A-KIND COLLECTIONS**

## Documenting contemporary perspectives

In the OHSU Oral History Program, Director of Special Collections **Maria Cunningham** and University Archivist **Steve Duckworth** added two new interviews with current OHSU change-makers working with historically marginalized communities, documenting their reflections in the midst of their ongoing work:



**Dr. Raina Croff** (SHARP Study Principal Investigator, Assistant Professor of Neurology) shared her background in medical anthropology and her work developing the Sharing History through Active Reminiscence and Photo-imagery (SHARP) study in the historically Black neighborhoods of North and Northeast Portland.



**Dr. Blair Peters** (Transgender Health Program Surgeon, Assistant Professor of Surgery) reflected on recent developments in genderaffirming healthcare, the importance of representation in medicine, and ongoing work to make OHSU a safer space for LGBTQ+ identifying patients and employees.

## Preserving a path-breaking legacy in neuropsychology

This year, we were thrilled to receive the papers of **Dr. Muriel Lezak** (1927–2021), trailblazing neuropsychologist, as a donation from her family. The author of the critical neuropsychology text, *Neuropsychological Assessment*, first published in 1976, Dr. Lezak spent decades as a clinician, educator, author and consultant focused on brain injury assessment, including the emotional and social impact on the patient. The collection, now described online and open for research use, offers a rich source of materials on neuropsychological scholarship and assessment.

## RELEVANT AND UNIQUE RESOURCES

### Health Zine Library shares fresh perspectives

Supported by a Network of the National Library of Medicine Collection Equity and Outreach Award, Director of Special Collections **Maria Cunningham** developed the OHSU Health Zine Library in 2022. A zine, short for fanzine or magazine, is a DIY, selfpublished, non-commercial publication typically made in limited quantities and edition sizes. Zines create dialogue and challenge us to reframe our ideas of authority through the sharing of lived experiences. The Health Zine Library provides contemporary zines related to health, wellness, and the human condition. With titles primarily centered on patient perspectives, the Health Zine Library marks an important addition to our collections, which have historically focused on the clinician viewpoint.

## Acting on OHSU members' suggestions

Each year, the Library examines data about collections and their relevance to OHSU members and the communities it serves to inform decisions about purchasing new journals, books, and databases. For example, in 2022, we started subscribing to *BMJ Case Reports* based on faculty and learner requests. The Library's agreement with the publisher provides access to cases from a variety of health disciplines. It also allows OHSU faculty and learners to submit unlimited cases for publication at no cost.

In addition to *BMJ Case Reports*, we started subscribing to more than 25 new journals and the database ClinicalKey after a successful pilot year. Our collections' ongoing and thoughtful management is foundational to the Library's support of learning, care, discovery, and well-being at OHSU.














## Electronic and print books in our collections

## STAFF DEVELOPMENT AND GROWTH

### **Scholarly activities**

The Library team's scholarly contributions and academic achievements in 2021-2022 reflected a continued commitment to improving higher education, broadening access to information, and amplifying a diversity of voices. A few examples are listed below; see Appendix for a complete list of scholarly activities.

- Health Sciences Education and Research Librarian Laura Zeigen co-authored the article "Trends in...Controlled Vocabulary and Health Equity," which describes several efforts to advance health equality indexing.
- With support from the John F. Helmer Professional Development Award through the Orbis Cascade Alliance, Director of Special Collections **Maria Cunningham** organized the first-ever Zines & Libraries Conference, which drew over 400 worldwide participants.
- In collaboration with the Northwest Narrative Medicine Collaborative, Digital Scholarship & Repository Librarian **Pamela Pierce** helped to build the digital curriculum library, Accessible Narrative Medicine. Funded by a grant from the Oregon Humanities Council, the library explores challenging health questions and highlights the stories of BIPOC, LGBTQ+, and persons living with disabilities.

### New faces, promotions and leadership changes

We welcomed two faculty members in 2021-22, **Brandon Wilkinson**, Health Sciences Education and Research Librarian, and **Carin Yavorcik**, Strategic Assessment Librarian. We also welcomed Library Technology Support Analyst **Robbie Buchanan** and Financial Analyst **Jennifer Fife** as key members of our operations team.

University Archivist **Steve Duckworth** was promoted to Associate Professor, and **Pamela Pierce** joined the professorial faculty track as Assistant Professor.

Finally, we bid farewell to **Kristine Alpi**, who left OHSU to become the Associate Dean of Libraries & Information Sciences at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai Health System.
